10-Point Plan Expert Roundtable No. 1: Controlling Borders while Ensuring Protection 20 – 21 November 2008, Geneva

Introduction

UNHCR in cooperation with the Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies, Geneva is planning to host an expert roundtable entitled 'Controlling borders while ensuring protection' in Geneva on 20 and 21 November 2008. The purpose of the roundtable is to identify key objectives of a protection-sensitive entry system in a mixed migration context and practical measures as to how they can be achieved.

Based on UNHCR's "10-Point Plan of Action on Refugee Protection and Mixed Migration" (10 Point Plan)², the roundtable aims at assessing past experiences and explore concrete steps to overcome real or perceived obstacles. Participants will discuss concrete measures on how to reconcile States' interest to effectively control their national borders, to curb irregular migration and prevent security threats, and the international protection needs of individuals.

The roundtable will bring together experts involved in border/entry management, at national land, sea or air borders. These will include government officials, international and national governmental and non-governmental organisations, private actors and academia from different regions.

The roundtable is the first of four UNHCR will organise as part of a two-year project on UNHCR's 10-Point Plan. The project also encompasses the compilation of good practices for a protection-sensitive management of mixed movements, which will be published in the form of a handbook structured along the 10-Point Plan. The discussions in the roundtables will constitute a primary source of good practice examples for the handbook.

Furthermore, the project includes the organisation of four regional conferences.³ Together the three project strands examine the central topic of mixed migration from different perspectives: The regional stakeholder conferences aim at enhancing responses to mixed migration in a particular regional context; the expert roundtables

- **Private Actors:** Airline and shipping companies
- Academia: Graduate Institute of International and Development Studies, Geneva, etc.
