The training will include a session on heightened risk identification using the second edition (draft version) of the Heightened Risk Identification Tool (HRIT). The action learning component of the training will involve, in a non-resettlement context, face-to-face interviews with refugees in urban Nairobi using this draft HRIT. The outcomes of this field test and feedback from participants on its utility in an urban context will be incorporated in the final version of the HRIT.

Last but not least, UNHCR would like to express its sincere gratitude to the Government of the United States that has generously funded this training initiative.
