## **Executive Summary:**

With 60 per cent of the world's 25.4 million refugees living in urban areas, cities are increasingly on the frontlines of the global refugee response. Mayors and local authorities, together with civil society, service providers and private sector partners, play an increasingly important role in welcoming and protecting displaced people who arrive in cities and fostering social cohesion.

Bringing together representatives from local authorities, NGOs, city networks and UNHCR, the session will demonstrate the positive impact of strong engagement between local authorities and NGOs to effectively support refugees in urban areas and enhance their self-reliance. The session will build on the outcomes of the High Commissioner's Dialogue on Protection Challenges in 2018, including the commitment to involve cities in the Global Refugee Forum. Panelists will share good practices from cities in Greece and Uganda, among others, and participants will be encouraged to reflect on initiatives which could be scaled up or replicated in cities in the lead up to the Global Refugee Forum. The session will also discuss potential contributions by cities and local authorities towards the Forum, including those that NGOs could support.
