- Let me start by thanking the co-conveners for organizing this first Global Refugee Forum.
- I am pleased for being able to participate in this debate, and I look forward to **exchanging views** with other stakeholders on good practices and experiences for the wellbeing of the refugees across the world.
- My country Croatia retains a dedicated and active role in implementing the comprehensive responses envisaged in the Global Compact for Refugees.
- Our history and recent practice have shown that we do not shy away from offering protection and help to those in need.
- We have been building our reception and protection system for refugees and asylum seekers since the 1990-es, when we hosted around 1 million refugees and internally displaced persons.
- We believe that in order to truly influence and transform the lives of refugees and host communities it is important to act together and create inclusive multi-stakeholder partnerships.
- Precisely this approach is interwoven within our **three pledges** that we have announced for the Global Refugee Forum.
- The <u>first</u> pledge is within our co-sponsorship for **Jobs and** Livelihoods theme. The <u>second</u> pledge falls under the Education theme, and the <u>third</u> pledge under Solutions, more precisely resettlement and relocation.

- As part of this comprehensive approach, Croatian Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs in collaboration with UNICEF is implementing the project for Syrian children refugees in Jordan, which will be finalized in April next year.
- The aim of the project is to improve learning conditions in refugee camps in Jordan Azraq and Za'atari by building five inclusive playgrounds with access for children with physical disabilities. Total cost was 200,000 EUR.
- Likewise, we are implementing another project worth 200.000 EUR in cooperation with UN Women. This project targets 110 women Syrian and Palestinian refugees and vulnerable Lebanon nationals; provides them with high quality and market-based ICT skills training, and supports their access to temporary or full-time employment at the local market. The aim is ensure economic empowerment of women thereby influencing the change in perception of the role of women in the society.
- Moreover, Croatia actively implements program for resettlement of applicants for international protection, and has fulfilled its commitment to resettle 250 Syrian refugees from Turkey.
- In this context, in February 2019, Croatian Government adopted a decision to resettle additional 100 Syrian refugees from Turkey, and to make available the possibility to relocate, as a matter of solidarity, 50 applicants for international protection from other EU Member States.
- I believe that these examples clearly demonstrate that, even in times of pressing challenges, Croatia is **firmly committed** to providing assistance to refugees, in particular by addressing root causes and creating conditions in countries of origin for voluntary return of refugees in safety and in dignity.
