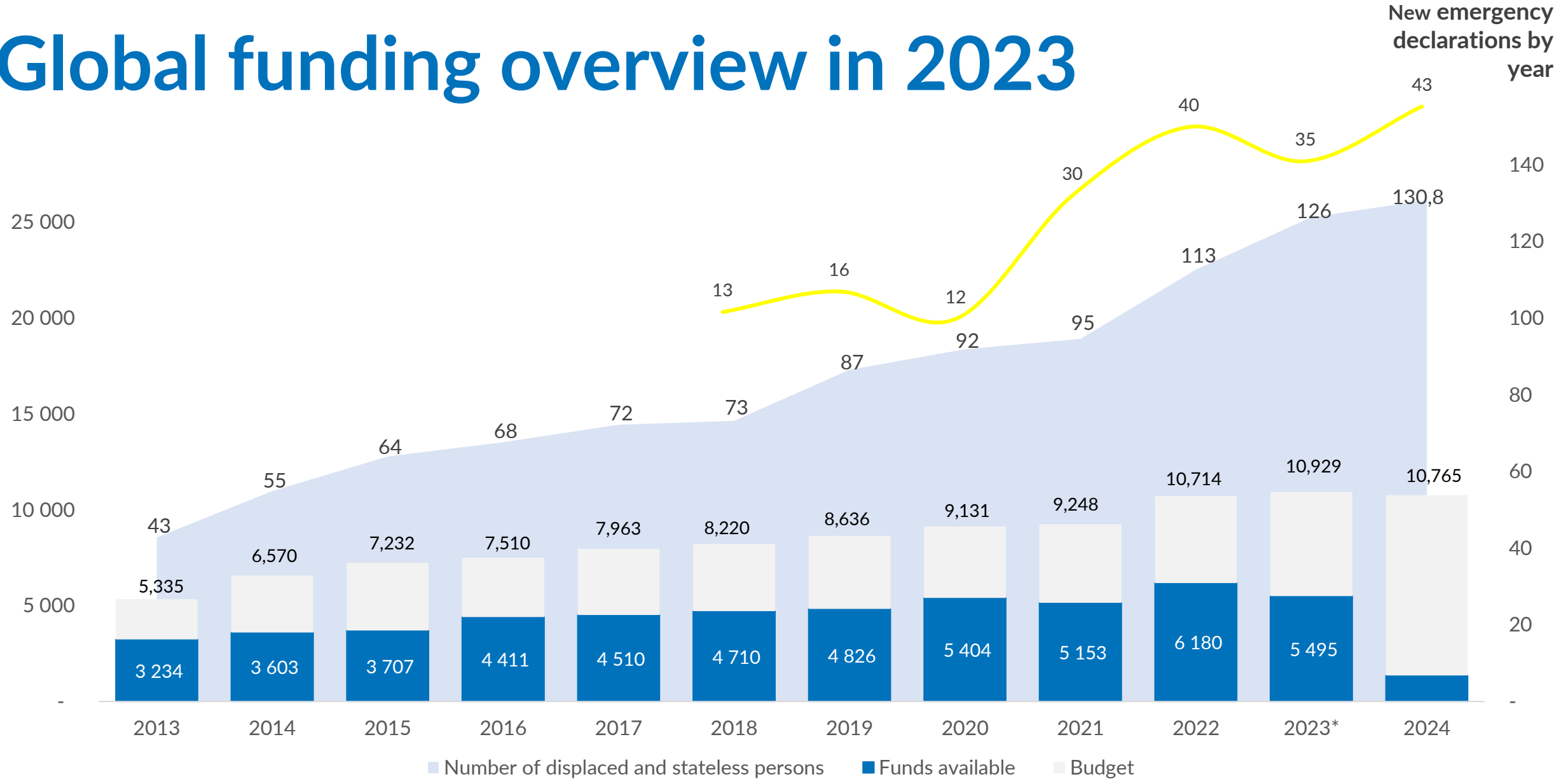

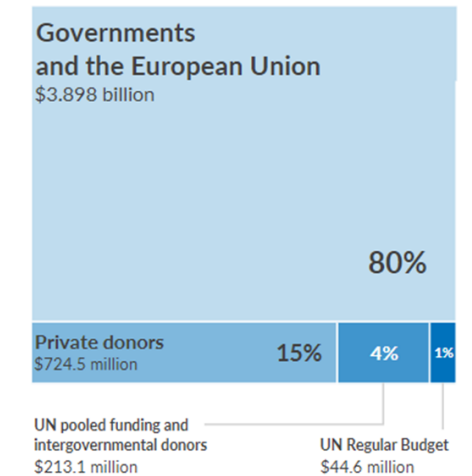
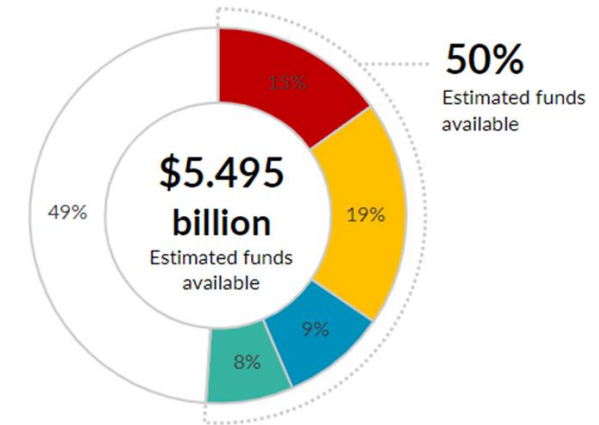
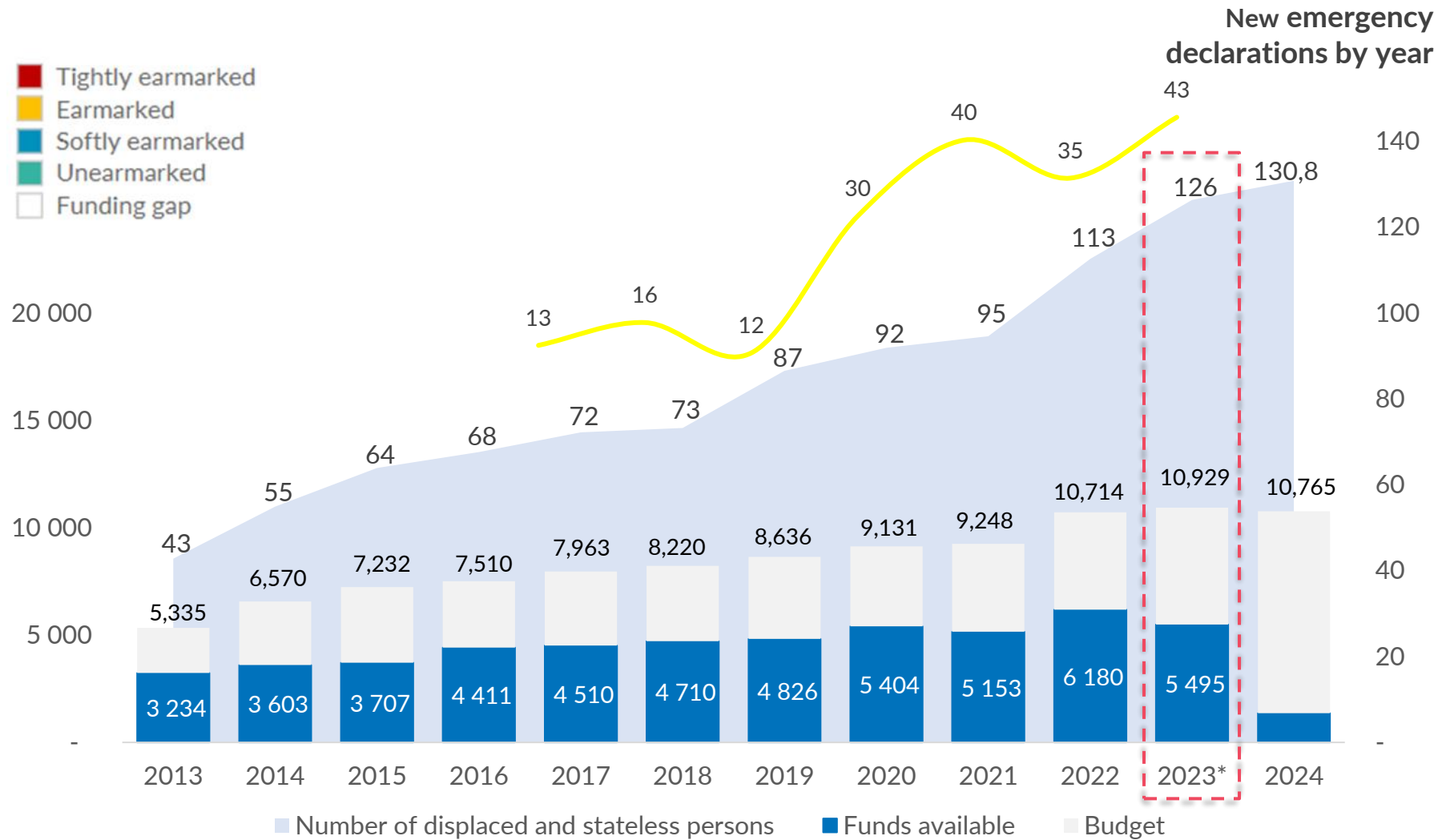
Global funding overview in 2023

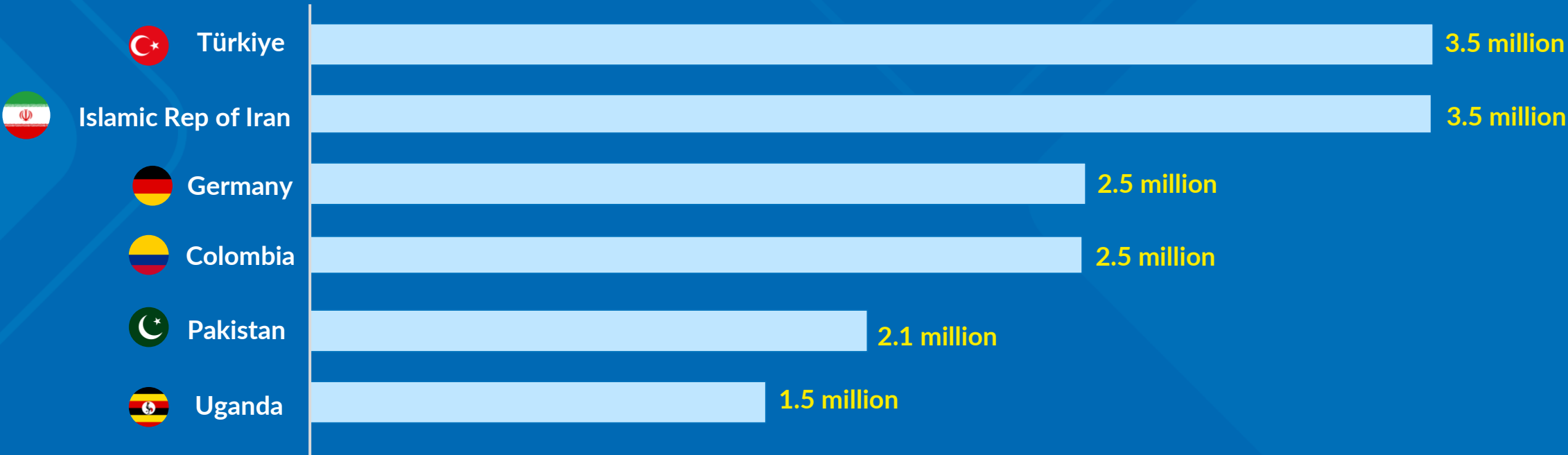
Global funding overview in 2023

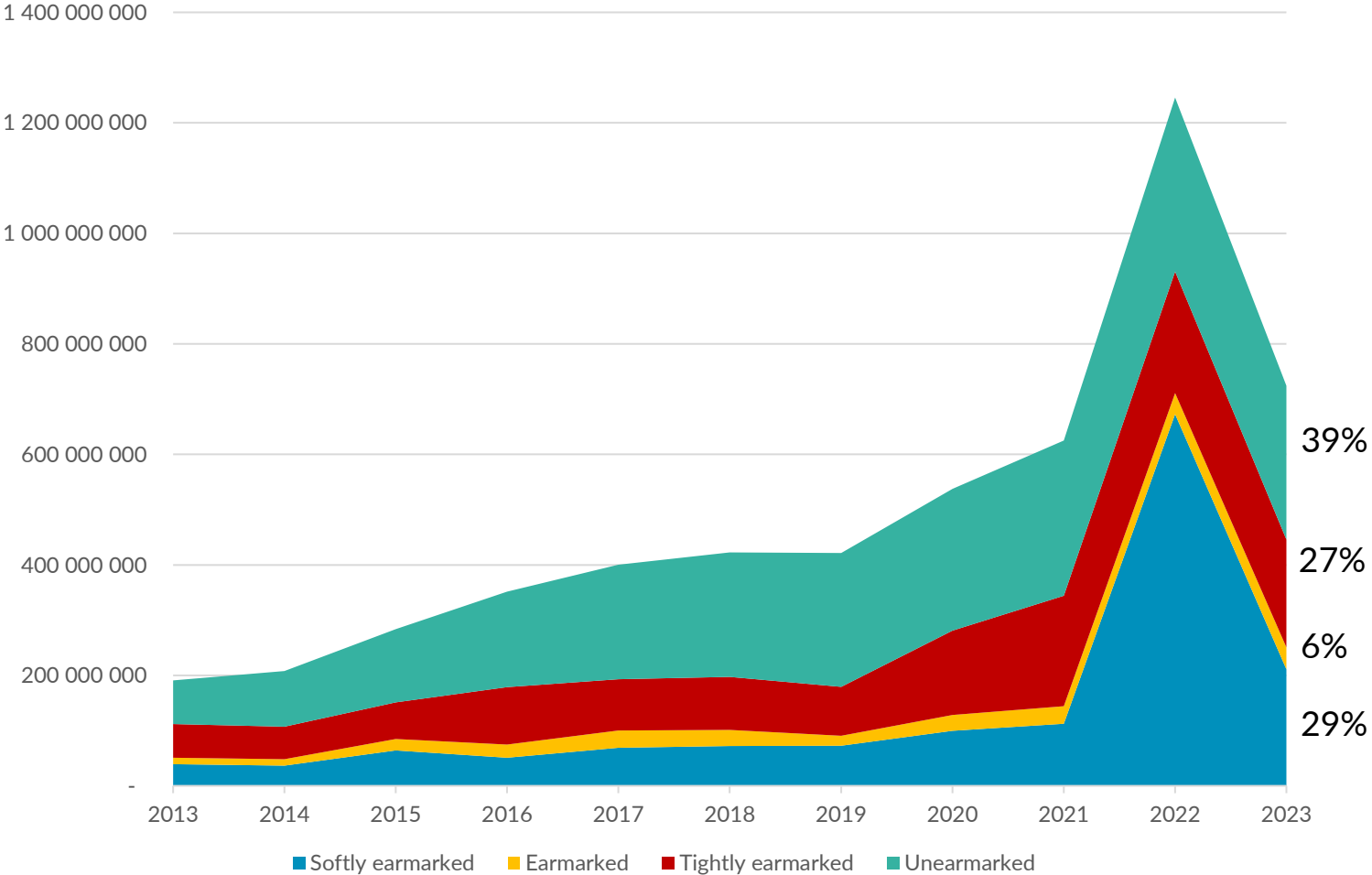

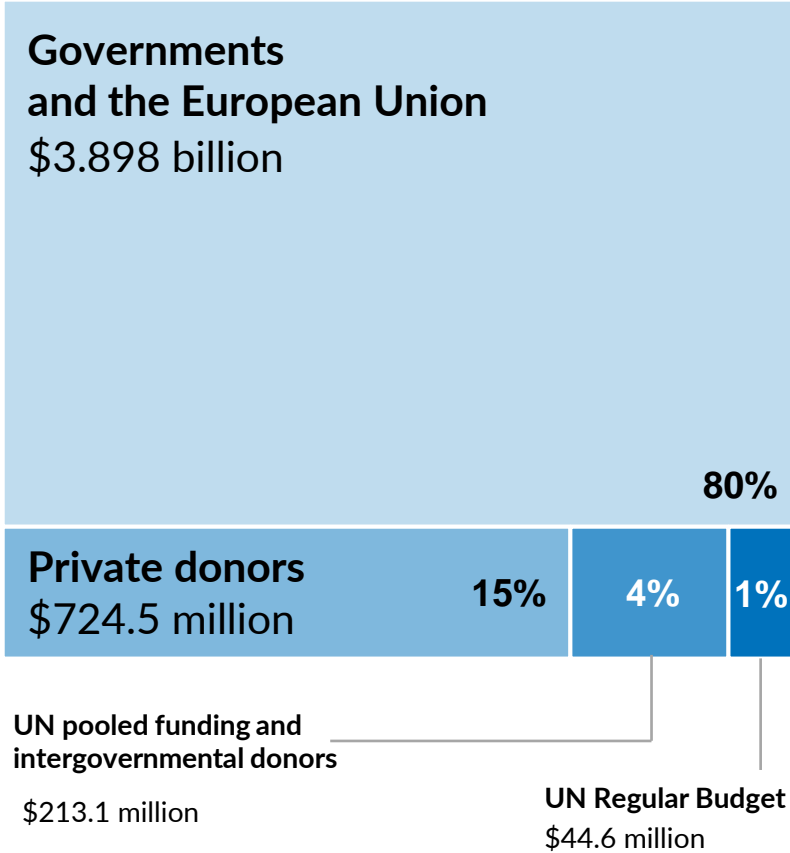

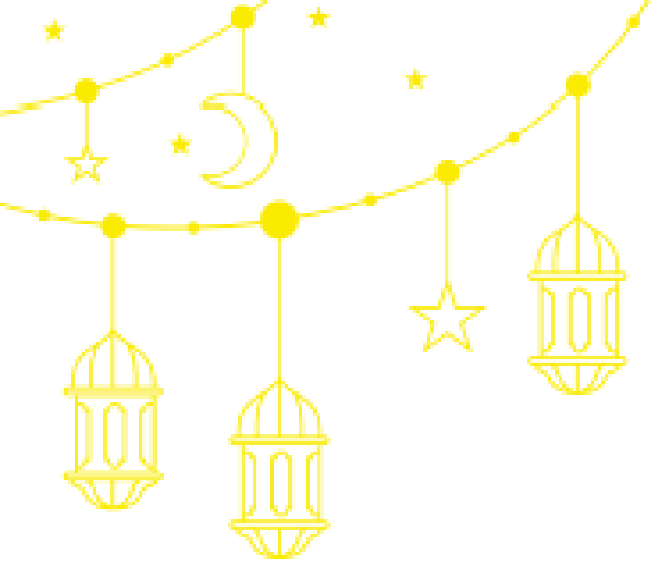
Private sector income evolution
