






Ethiopia



By 2027, we strive to achieve these two pledge in at least 15 refugee-hosting countries, enabled by financial, material, and technical support.



- o **235 pledges** were made by multistakeholder partners on health inclusion and MHPSS.
- Of those, 113 pledges were related to MHPSS, of which 96 directly linked to the MSP.
- Altogether, 88 entities from across the world pledge their support, aiming to reach more than 13 million people

FOSTERING MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL WELLBEING PLEDGE

Recent Milestones:

- World Health Assembly Resolution: Adopted in May, focusing on strengthening MHPSS before, during, and after crises (e.g., armed conflicts, disasters, emergencies).
- Interagency Minimum Service Package: Promoted through the multi-stakeholder pledge 'Advancing Quality MHPSS for Displaced Persons and Host Communities.' Implemented in various settings since the Global Refugee Forum, including the Sudan Refugee Response with capacity-building workshops in Chad, Ethiopia, and South Sudan.

Ongoing Efforts: Enhancing MHPSS for refugees, including in humanitarian settings.

Strengthening mental health and psychosocial support before, during and after armed conflicts, natural and human-caused disasters and health and other emergencies

The Seventy-seventh World Health Assembly

Having considered the consolidated report by the Director-General

Reaffirming the right of everyone to the enjoyment of the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health;

Recalling United Nations General Assembly resolution 77/800 (2023) on Mental health and psychosocial support, Human Rights Council resolution 52/12 (2023) on Mental health and human rights and United Nations Security Council resolution 2668 (2022) on United Nations peacekeeping operations in which the importance of mental health services for peace operations personnel was emphasized;

Reaffirming United Nations General Assembly resolution 46/182 (1991)⁵ and subsequent resolutions including 78/119 (2023)⁶ on Strengthening of the coordination of humanitarian emergency assistance of the United Nations:

WHO's Refugee and Migrant Health System Reviews


Objective: Support the development of informed, evidence-based long-term health system interventions that build on existing capacities while addressing gaps and opportunities.
