

Global Timeline to the HLOM 2025






Update on Pledge Implementation

3,302 pledges total (2023 & 2019)

- 707 pledges since GRF 2019 fulfilled
- 56% of GRF 2019 pledges fulfilled

691 pledge updates received in 2024

- 503 in progress
- 35 in planning phase
- 153 fulfilled
- 364 updates made by States & 121 updates made by Civil Society Actors
- Majority of updates from Europe & Americas






Update on Pledge Implementation

Most reported multistakeholder pledges:

- Self-reliance (Education, Economic Inclusion and Social Protection, Gender, Health)
- 3rd country solutions (Resettlement, Family Reunification)
- Cross-cutting (Sports, Meaningful Refugee Participation)





Stocktaking - key considerations

Stocktaking should place equal emphasis on showing **impact and results** of **GCR implementation through pledges** and **key trends in terms of challenges and gaps**, and how to address them

The HLOM – as the primary forum for global stocktaking of GRF pledges and progress toward the GCR objectives – serves as an **opportunity for accountability**, to **highlight unfulfilled ambitions** and cultivate needed **political and financial support**


Stocktaking process should be **light and flexible** to adapt to differing contexts

The process will also be informed by **data** including through the **GCR indicator framework**

The outcomes will inform the strategic priorities and roadmap to the GRF 2027

- <u>Engage refugees</u> and the organizations they lead in the stocktaking and reporting process > new guidance
- Focus stocktaking on <u>impact and results</u>

Multistakeholder Pledge on Resettlement

Background

Within the framework of the Third Country Solutions for Refugees - Roadmap 2030, the objective of resettling a cumulative total of over 1 million refugees by the end of 2030 has been articulated. This can be achieved through targeted legal and policy reform to support new and scaled up resettlement programmes that are sustainable and that respond to identified needs and have maximum protection impact.

Pledge follow-up mechanisms:

- Mainstreamed into ongoing, existing strong relationships and mechanisms with Resettlement countries related to quota discussions and resettlement processing.
- Consultations on Resettlement & Complementary Pathways (CRCP)
- Priority Situations Core Group (PSCG)

Multistakeholder Pledge on Community Sponsorship

Background: Goal to develop, continue or expand sponsorship programmes to grow third country solutions, enhance integration prospects and strengthen community narratives.

Follow-up Mechanism: Global Refugee Sponsorship Initiative (GRSI), UNHCR

Progress towards Implementation:

- New/expanded sponsorship pathways and community sponsorship programmes in Brazil,
 Ireland and the US.
- Joint CSO Network Pledge new Sponsorship Group Formation Toolkit; Global Sponsorship Summit (Dublin, Nov 2024).
- Global Sponsorship Fund Bosch Foundation and Gov of Italy's inaugural donations > work towards establishment and piloting of the Fund.

2024 - One million refugees welcomed by sponsorship programmes since 2016.



Skills-based complementary pathways, Machine-readable Travel Documents, and Family Reunification

MULTI-STAKEHOLDER PLEDGE: Skills-Based Complementary Pathways

Led by the Global Task Force on Refugee Labour Mobility and the Global Task Force on Third Country Education Pathways, this pledge aims to achieve the goal of 200,000 refugees arriving on labour mobility and education pathways in 5 years time.

MULTI-STAKEHOLDER PLEDGE: Refugee Travel Documents

Pledges to provide, improve and accept State-issued machine-readable refugee travel documents which allow departure and return to the countries of asylum without risk of being refouled.

MULTI-STAKEHOLDER PLEDGE: Family Reunification

Led by the Global Family Reunification Network (FRUN), this pledge has three pillars on 1) law and policy, 2) support and facilitation, and 3) data and evidence to help 1 million refugees reunited with their families by 2030.



Digital Protection - Prevention of the Harmful Impact of Hate Speech, Misinformation, and Disinformation

The Challenge

Information risks such as misinformation, disinformation and hate speech, create or sustain protection risks faced by forcibly displaced and stateless communities.

They propagate harmful stereotypes and false narratives, creating new risks.

They can undermine our collective work to address protection and solutions.

Misinformation and disinformation can erode trust in humanitarian organizations and civil society.

They can exacerbate social tensions, and narrow opportunities for solutions and self-reliance



The Pledge

Pledge Objective: To increase the number of stakeholders taking action to better understand, respond to and help prevent the harmful impact on displaced and stateless communities, and on humanitarian action, of misinformation, disinformation and hate speech.

Multi-stakeholder: 23 Pledges global and national levels: Governments, Private/Tech Sector, Civil Society, NGOs, Refugee-Led Orgs and United Nations orgs

Diverse Geographic Footprint:

Research, field based pilots, developing tools & common standards, capacity building, investment in under resourced languages

Contributes to Objective 4 of the Global Compact on Refugees: "Voluntary, sustainable return, reintegration, address root causes, prevent conflict and build peace"



Norway's commitment

Pledge: Financial and technical support through the Humanitarian Innovation Programme.

South Africa: A pioneering new pilot working with multiple stakeholders to test pre-emptive solutions to addressing misinformation and disinformation (UNHCR).

Laaha: A virtual safe space providing trusted information on GBV and SRHR – currently in 10 languages (UNICEF).

Objectives & Key achievements

- Increasing the safe and dignified access to GBV prevention and response services
- Supporting the work of organizations led by forcibly displaced and stateless women
- Mainstreaming gender equality and GBV risk mitigation across pledges
- ⇒ More than 100 stakeholders mobilized
- \Rightarrow 116 pledges to date
- ⇒ 3-fold increase in pledges compared to 2019



Next steps

- Pledge co-leads meet regularly to review pledges' progress, follow up and collective awareness raising and mobilization
- Stock-tacking event in 2025
- High-Level Officials Meeting in December 2025
