# FUNDING UPDATE

#### FINANCIAL SITUATION

UNHCR started the year with USD 304.7 million, of which USD 237 million had been pledged at the Pledging Conference in New York in November 2000 or the subsequent launch of the Global Appeal in Geneva in December. Those pledges provided UNHCR with some 25 per cent of its requirements at the beginning of the year, as compared to 17 per cent available at the same time in 2000. This result justifies expectations that the formal transfer of the Pledging Conference to Geneva in 2001 will positively impact on early and substantial pledges. The funds available on 1 January included USD 67.7 million carried over from 2000 (a large portion of which was tightly earmarked) as compared to USD 93.7 million carried over from 1999 into 2000

Initial funding projections for 2001 indicated a possible shortfall of over 20 per cent against initial requirements of USD 953.7 million. Although anticipated new contributions subsequently increased somewhat, secondary income was expected to be lower than anticipated.

In order to deal with this situation, the Office initially imposed a spending limit of 80 per cent of the approved budget. This was immediately followed by Action 1, 2 and 3, initiated by the High Commissioner, as described in the previous chapter. This resulted in a downward revision of the Annual Programme Budget to 752.8 million and a decrease of the Supplementary Programme Budget to USD 66.1 million. The total revised 2001 Budget at the end of June 2001 thus stood at USD 874.4 million (including the allocation from the UN Regular Budget - USD 19.2 million - and JPOs – USD 7 million). Details may be found in the relevant table in this Chapter.

As at 28 August 2001, three Supplementary Programmes had been added or increased

(fYROM, IDPs in Afghanistan, Human Security Commission) resulting in a current Budget of USD 882.1 million. At the same date, the total income from contributions stood at USD 579.1 million.

Nevertheless, year-end projections are showing a possible shortfall of some USD 60 million against the current Budget. This shortfall, if confirmed, will need to be managed by cautiously obligating funds in the fourth quarter according to income received and implementation rates.

The shortfall can also be reduced to the extent that the Operational Reserve remains unused. Allocations from the Reserve as at 30 June stood at USD 22.6 million. See table below for details. At the time of writing, the balance of the Operational Reserve stands at USD 48.5 million.

In the past months, UNHCR has been in close contact with governmental donors to promote early, flexible and predictable contributions. The High Commissioner wrote to the main governmental donors on several occasions, inter alia to appeal for "normative" levels of contributions. Fortunately, the call for early pledges was clearly heard and, contrary to 2000, liquidity levels remained sufficient up to the time of writing. Should, however, expected pledges be slow in being confirmed, UNHCR may have no choice but to resort once again to the Working Capital and Guarantee Fund in order to ensure that operations can proceed uninterrupted, pending confirmation expected but not yet formalised pledges.

Donors continue to earmark contributions at various levels. At 30 June, totally unearmarked contributions stood at 27 per cent of total contributions. A positive development is that earmarkings at country level have decreased in favour of earmarkings at higher (regional and subregional) levels.

# PRIVATE SECTOR FUND RAISING (PSFR)

In line with its strategy to increase the level of funding from the private sector, UNHCR convened a workshop in Geneva in March, which was attended by delegates from UNHCR National Associations and Branch Offices involved in private sector fundraising activities. The workshop resulted in an agreement to give priority, in 2001, to the establishment of strong foundations for private sector activities, to focus resources on countries where a private sector fundraising structure was in place and to start development work in only two additional countries (China-Hong Kong and Canada). The target for private sector fund-raising in 2001 was realistically reviewed at USD 15 million

As at 1 September, some USD 5.5 million been received while contributions are in the pipeline as a result of fund raising activities by UNHCR and its National Associations. These funds were raised through special events. direct marketing, major donations, corporations and foundations. The newest National Associations, Argentina con ACNUR. Australia for UNHCR, Action Réfugiés, and Japan for UNHCR concentrated their efforts on strengthening their fund-raising capacity. The attached table summarises the main PSFR activities, as well as donations announced during the first half of the year. The remainder of 2001 will be devoted to the fine-tuning of mechanisms and tools to support private fund-raising sector programs: review of the co-operation agreement with National Associations, creation of an emergency fund-raising kit, development of a tripartite planning methodology, definition of key performance indicators, training and handbooks. An online donation page will be launched with links to National Associations' websites, and a Knowledge Database Centre collecting successful fund-raising examples will be created and will be accessible to the network of fund-raising partners, Branch Offices and National Associations. A "share and compare" workshop is planned for October.

#### **DEFINITIONS**

The value date of all financial data presented in this report is 30 June 2001, unless otherwise indicated. The following financial terms have been used in this report:

- *Initial Budget*: Requirements presented in the Global Appeal 2001
- Revised Budget: Revised level of activities.
- Total Funds Available: Includes opening balance (carry-over), income from contributions made in the current year and internal adjustments
- *Total Funds Obligated*: The maximum spending authority for an operation. This amount is established in response to needs expressed by the operation, within the funds available for that operation.

Funds Available reported in financial tables are limited to country operations which were included in the 2001 Global Appeal.
