Asylum ranks low on the public agenda despite the fact that number of new arrivals and applications has been steadily increasing since 2020 Strategic engagement with key stakeholders and various actors to expand protection and solutions and improve public perception, including via Emergency Transit Centre in Timisoara.

Persons of concern enjoy an enabling protection and solutions environment. Refugees benefit from integration prospects and community support.

COVID-19 PREVENTION AND RESPONSE

Advocacy: Romania successfully called on authorities to keep the borders open for asylum-seekers despite the pandemic, as well as to include Persons of Concern (POCs) in the national vaccination programmes.

Communication with Communities: Platforms for information and support were created to ensure that refugees and asylum-seekers have equal and non-discriminatory access to health and other basic services. Alternative channels of communication were developed to ensure that protection risks, needs and gaps were properly monitored and addressed.

Health: UNHCR distributed PPEs, hygienic and disinfection materials, and rapid tests to complement government's intervention. Also, it helped with design and dissemination of the information campaign for the COVID-19 vaccine.

granted in Romania since 2019, by two top 5 universities, through newly developed partnerships with academia.

6,265 asylum requests

submitted at the end of August 2021, surpassing the total number of requests received in 2020 (6,158) and close three times higher than 2018 (2,318) and 2019 (2,586).

Key Priorities

- Access to territory and procedures: Monitoring and advocacy for unhindered access of people in need of international protection to territory and asylum procedure.
- Romania keeps its borders open for people in need of international protection as the number of arrivals via the border with Serbia remains high.
- Capacity building to strengthen asylum procedures and improve the quality of decisions. Advocacy to ensure protection information, assistance, and representation available at all procedural stages.
- Reception conditions: Monitoring, advocacy, and training to ensure adequate standards, including alternatives to detention, in law and practice.
- Working to mainstream gender-based violence/GBV prevention, identification, and response and to improve inclusion of multi-stakeholder response and effective case management.
- Advocacy for coherent child protection legislation, and best interest procedures as well as providing capacity building to relevant institutions.
- Resettlement and Complementary Pathways: Advocacy and support to enhance the resettlement programme and use of complementary pathways, as pledged at 2019 Global Refugee Forum.
- Integration: Advocacy, engagement, and capacity building to enhance refugees' access to housing, labour market, education, and language training. Providing support to refugees on naturalization, family reunification and access to integration services. Supporting refugee participation by fostering community empowerment initiatives.
- Education: Engagement with academia and other actors to facilitate access to education (scholarships) and awareness (UNHCR Teaching Kit).

■ Public attitudes towards Persons of concern:

Promote welcoming environment, create empathy, and mobilize action through conventional, media and social media engagement, public events, and a variety of communications partnerships.

Working with Partners

- Supporting state institutions and authorities (i.e. Immigration, Border Police) to enhance their capacity of delivering quality protection and assistance to persons of concern.
- UNHCR strengthens civil society capacity to advocate for and intervene in asylum, expands the pool of partners and supports the NGO Advocacy Coalition for the Rights of Refugees and Migrants. UNHCR works with NGOs such as AIDRom, CNRR, and JRS Romania (funded partnerships), and Anais on GBV-related activities
- External Engagement: Strengthening and diversifying partnerships with institutional actors, municipalities, academia, and research institutes to address the challenges of refugee integration. Develop partnerships (private sector entities, high profile supporters, diplomatic community, civil society) to foster awareness of refugee protection and UNHCR's work.

Statelessness

 Advocacy for the lifting of Romania's reservations to the 1954 Convention on the Status of Stateless persons and to establish the statelessness determination procedures.
