






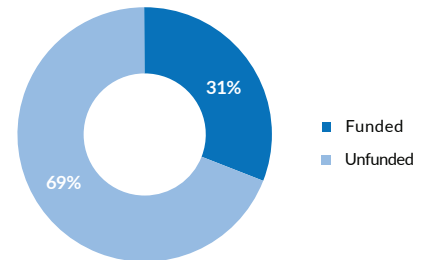

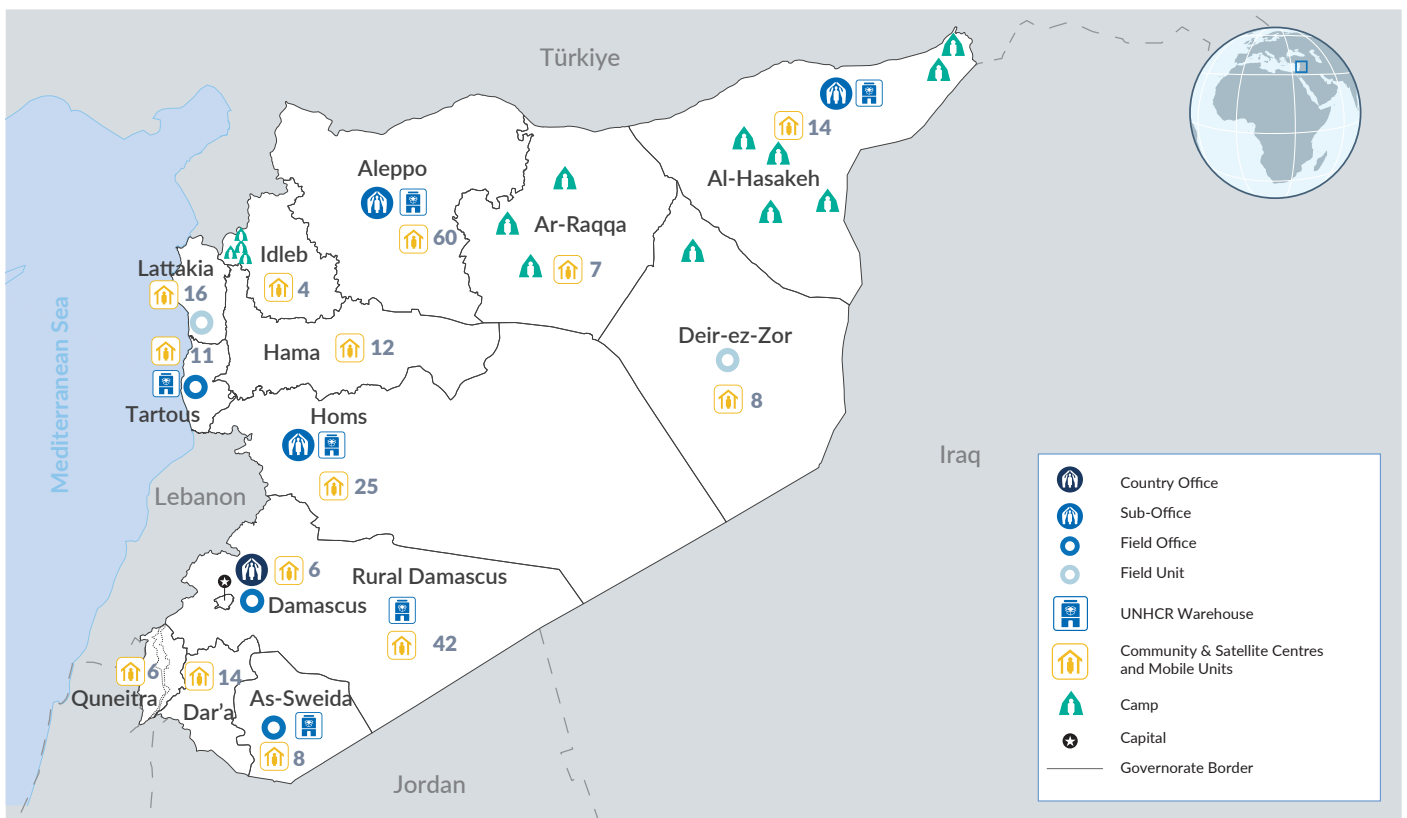
## UNHCR Syria Key Figures

-  **6.8 million** are internally displaced\*
-  **2 million** people live in informal settlements and planned camps\*
-  **155,325** IDP returnees\*\*
-  **38,257** refugee returnees\*\*\*
-  **16,880** refugees and asylum-seekers registered with UNHCR

**USD 504.3 million** requested for the Syria Operation in 2023

## UNHCR Syria Achievements (including the Earthquake Response)

 **Registration**

**15,463 UNHCR identification cards issued**  
A total of 16,900 refugees and asylum-seekers were registered with UNHCR by end of December 2023.

 **Refugee Status Determination (RSD)**

**222 people recognized as refugees**  
This is based on individual RSD assessments conducted.

## Community-Based Support

**1,300,000** people received services at UNHCR-supported community centres

Community centres provide protection services, such as child protection activities, catch-up classes for students and legal assistance including birth registration and civil documentation.



## Community Mobilization

**2,550** outreach volunteers engaged in 14 governorates

Volunteers play a vital role in linking UNHCR with vulnerable communities where they establish and maintain regular contact, monitor situations, understand needs and identify the most vulnerable amongst the communities.



## Child Protection

**12,161** children-at-risk received support

This support includes counselling by trained caseworkers on issues such as child labour, early marriage, emotional distress, violence, and neglect.



## Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS)

**10,100** people received MHPSS

These interventions contribute to the overall well-being and inclusion of persons with specific needs in society.



## Cash-Based Interventions for Refugees

**5,288** refugee households received multi-purpose cash grants on a bi-monthly basis

Additionally, **5,952** households including asylum-seekers, received cash assistance for winterization.



## Cash-Based Interventions for Syrians

**13,718** earthquake-affected households received multi-purpose cash grants

Also, **896** households benefited from the cash-based intervention pilot project for IDPs, which replaced in-kind assistance.



## Legal Aid

**407,000** people received legal assistance

This is focused on civil documentation and housing, land and property (HLP) rights, with legal representation and counselling.



## Gender-Based Violence (GBV)

**7,643** people supported with GBV response services

This includes counselling, referrals to specialized health services, protection interventions and legal assistance.



## Core Relief Items (CRIs)

**137,190** households benefited from CRIs

This includes **9,297** households who were targeted with emergency response. A standard CRI kit comprises plastic sheets, mattresses, solar lamps, high thermal blankets, sleeping mats, jerry cans and kitchen sets.



## Shelter

**6,932** households received shelter assistance

This includes repair of damaged houses and provision of shelter material packages for minor repairs. Also, **4,311** earthquake-affected households received assistance through the cash-for-shelter repair programme.



## Livelihoods and Self-Reliance

**9,488** people benefited from livelihood support programmes

This includes training and support to small start-up businesses, provision of agricultural kits and engagement in apprenticeship and temporary employment schemes.



## Education

**55,600** students benefited from remedial and catch-up classes

This helps in enhancing the students' academic performance and contributed to preventing school dropouts.
